I should also add that responding to such a request with "I'll see what I can do!" is heard by African ears as it is a settled issue. To avoid this, I suggest using a statement like "It is my intention to see what can be done" □ Aiding is Abetting, An interview with Dambisa Moyo, Guernica Magazine — April 2009. Born in Zambia, Dambisa Moyo makes a convincing case that government to government financial aid does much more harm than good. I have personally spent much time in many very remote villages and have never seen any visible evidence of even one dollar of the millions and millions of dollars of aid reaching the poorest of the poor.
