Subject: Saturday, January 22nd Uganda Update

We again have been very busy with poor Internet access so this will be a catchup update. Not enough time to do day by day.

On Monday we with went Sam Kisembo to a very poor area of Entebbe town. We did evangelism for a small church that is in the heart of the area. In the early afternoon the pastor said they were planning a youth event (youth up to late 20's) that evening and the speaker had just called and could not come. He then asked if I would come back and speak to the youth and that their theme was 1 Samuel 3:1. That verse is one of the key verses in my "Six Things to Remember" which I have not shared since 2008. I found the notes and went back with Pastor Sam. I was shocked to find every seat in the building taken.

On Tuesday we went back to Sam's church for evangelism.

On Wednesday we traveled to Katakwi in North East Uganda. Dr. K has been conducting a school of evangelism. I filled in one class to give his voice some rest. We have also been doing evangelism in this area.

Tomorrow we will worship and preach in area churches and then head to Serrie for another school of evangelism. I was last there in 1999. We will be there until Wednesday when we return to Lookout Ridge Guest House.

In our door to door evangelism today we discovered a young lady (age 21) walking with a cane and prosthetic leg. Her parents were killed in a cattle raid by the Karamojon twelve years ago. The Karamojon live to the East and regularly raided this area until the Ugandan army stationed troops here a few years ago.

She was shot in her leg and eventually lost the leg. It is doubtful she will ever marry as most young men would find her handicap an issue. We gave her funds to buy a new walking cane as her present one is at the end of it ability to be extended. She needs \$300 for a new prosthetic leg. Uganda has universal health care, but little money to fund it with.

On Friday, several large trucks arrived filled with all kinds of fresh vegetables for sale. Hard to grow things in this hot dry area. People from as far away as Karamoja (4 hours) gathered to purchase the vegetables.
